





Bureau of Health Workforce Scholarship Programs for Nurses

The National Health Service Corps (NHSC) Scholarship Program and Nurse Corps Scholarship Program provide funding to nursing students and other future health care professionals committed to serving in communities of need. Nurse practitioner and certified nurse midwife students are eligible to apply to more than one program, but are only permitted to accept a scholarship from one.

This resource outlines the similarities and differences between the programs.

Note: The NHSC Scholarship Program accepts applications from nursing and other health profession students. The eligibility requirements and funding preferences vary by program.

Applicant must be accepted or enrolled as a full student in an accredited degree program pursuing an Associate, Baccalaureate, Graduate, or Doctorate Degree in one of the following primary care disciplines: Nurse Practitioner Certified Nurse Midwife Registered Nurse Clinical Nurse Specialist Registered Nurse Anesthetists Applications are prioritized using holistic approach selection factors and a funding preference. Applicants with the greatest financial need as determined by the applicant's expected family contribution on the official Student Aid Report, calculated by the Department of Education.
